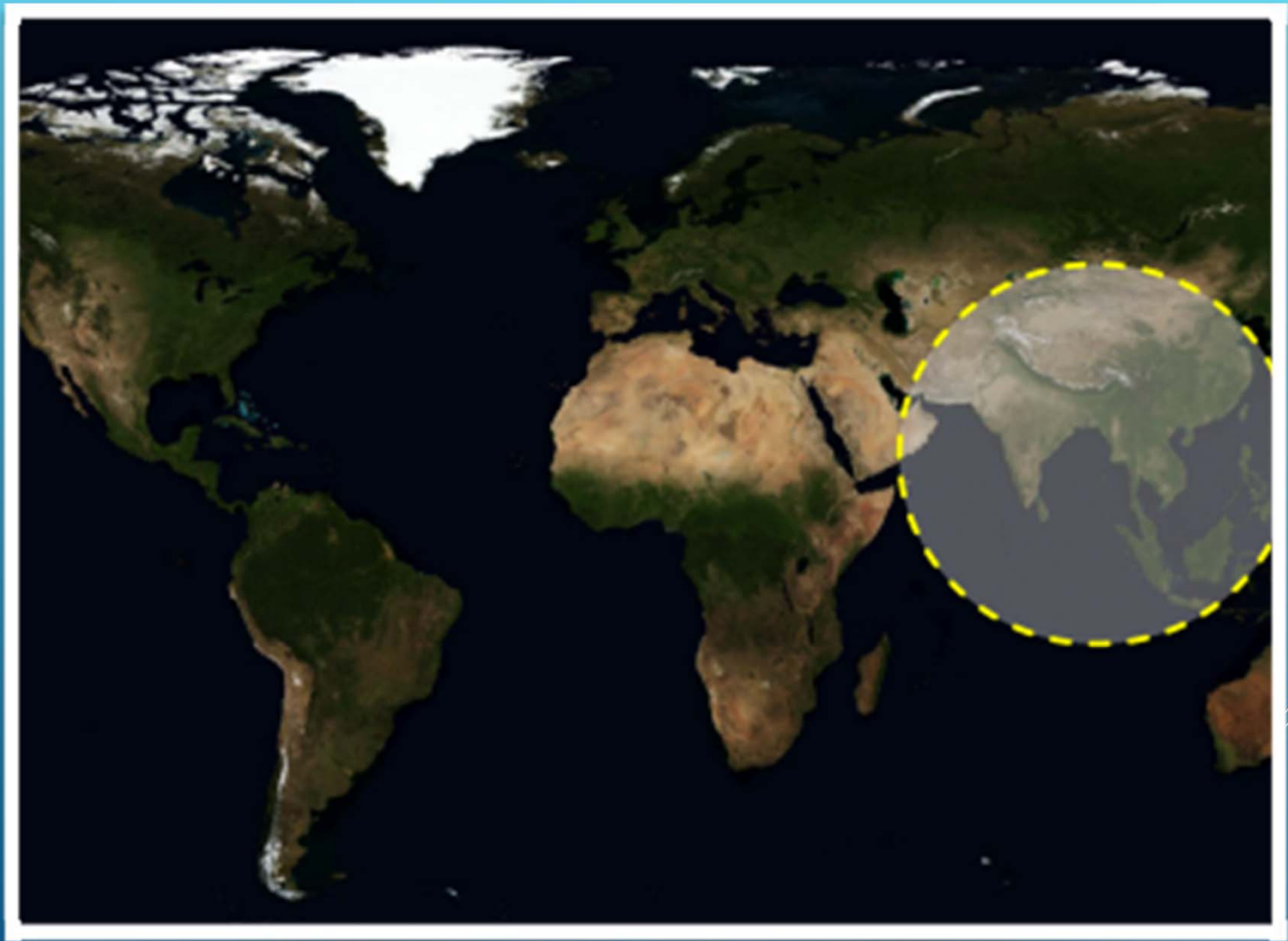

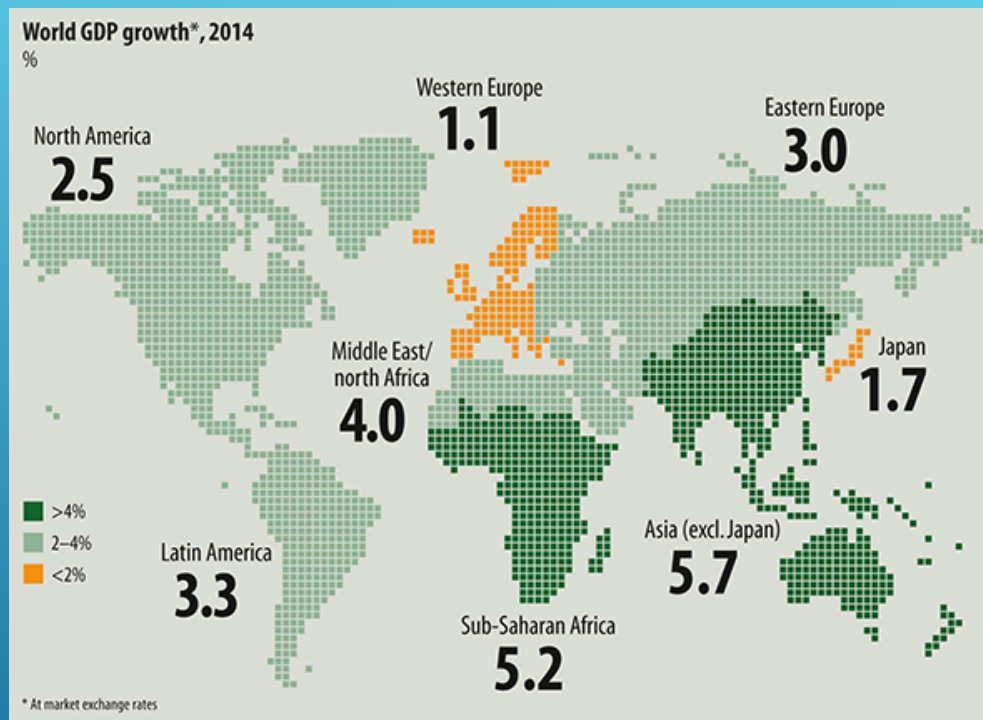
## Survey on Principals' Perception of Global Competence

72% of principals reported that there were little or no opportunities for teacher professional development to help teachers in their school develop skills and knowledge to develop global competence.

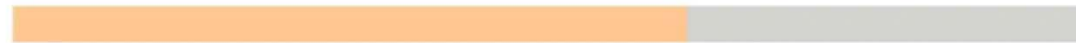


# World's Fastest Growing Economies

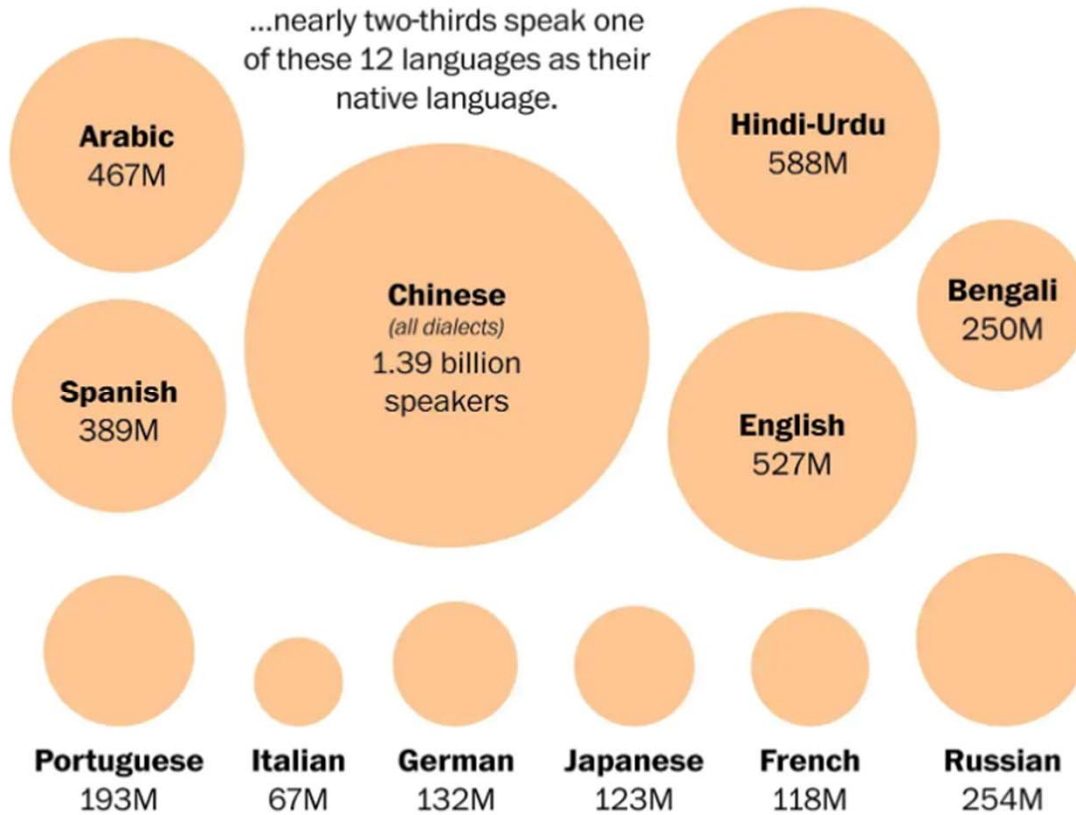

# So what does it mean to be Globally Competent?

*“Global competence is defined in PISA as ‘the capacity to examine global and intercultural issues, to take multiple perspectives, to engage in open, appropriate and effective interactions with people from different cultures and to act for collective well-being and sustainable development’.”*

Why is global competence important?



In 2013, Google decided to test its hiring hypothesis by crunching every bit and byte of hiring, firing, and promotion data accumulated since the company's incorporation in 1998. Project Oxygen shocked everyone by concluding that, among the eight most important qualities of Google's top employees, STEM expertise comes in dead last. The seven top characteristics of success at Google are all soft skills: being a good coach; communicating and listening well; possessing insights into others (including others different values and points of view); having empathy toward and being supportive of one's colleagues; being a good critical thinker and problem solver; and being able to make connections across complex ideas.

# Economy/Business continued...

Employee's lack of international knowledge can result in embarrassing blunders which can foster negative attitudes towards the U.S.

- 80% of business leaders expected their overall business would increase if they had more internationally competent employees
- It is estimated that billions are spent per year by American firms on failed overseas assignments and inadequate guidance for multicultural situations

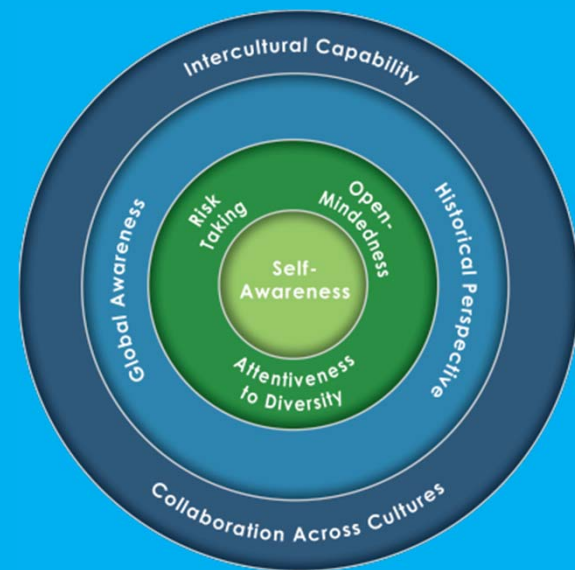

# GLOBAL COMPETENCE ASSESSMENT

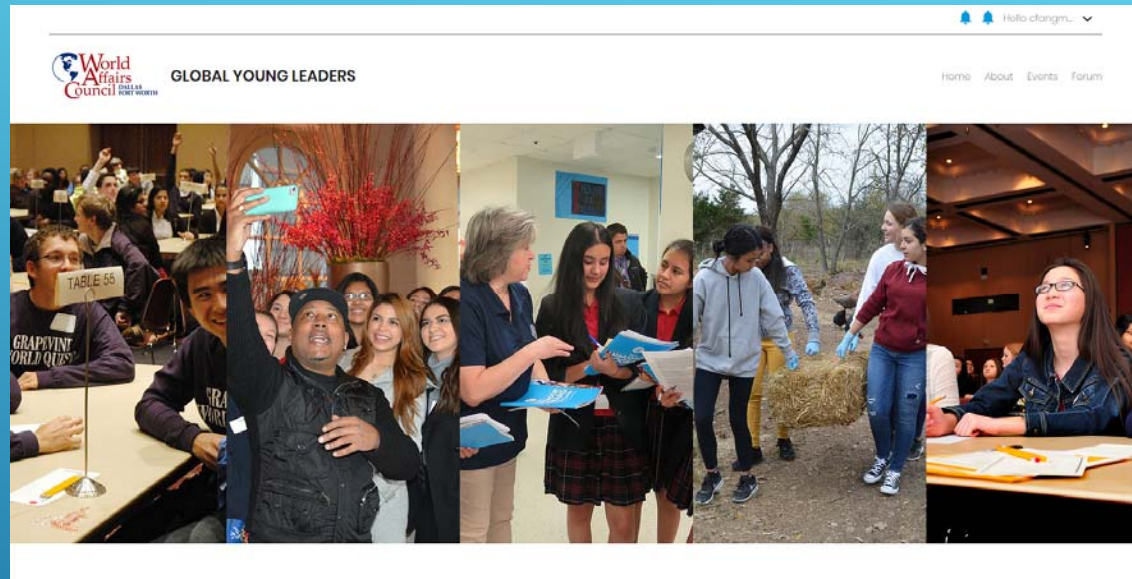
Global Competence Associates, LLC are the leaders in the original worldwide consensus research on global competence since 1999. Our rigorous research is foundational to our portfolio of supportive services such as assessment, training, certification, and consultation. We are the creators of the Global Competence Aptitude Assessment (GCAA)®, which objectively measures the cultural knowledge, people skills, and attitudes that are critical for global readiness.

In 2013 and 2015, the Council measured Global Competence using this GCAA test. We plan to bring this back in April-May 2020.

We will select 10 JWACS and provide pizza parties at the campus. For a control group, we will also need a NON JWAC student for each JWAC student from your school.

# WORLD AFFAIRS COUNCILS OF AMERICA

The World Affairs Council of Dallas/Fort Worth is a member of the World Affairs Councils of America (WACA) network, which traces its earliest roots to 1918, when the League of Free Nations Association was formed to support President Wilson's efforts to achieve peace. At the end of World War I, the Association's founders were concerned that Americans would choose isolationism over a foreign policy based on international engagement. They worked to promote and nurture public awareness of critical international issues affecting the U.S., and in 1923 reconstituted the organization as the Foreign Policy Association. John Foster Dulles and Eleanor Roosevelt were among the FPA's incorporators.

Today, there are roughly 90 World Affairs Councils throughout the United States with a share mission. In an age of globalization and a rapidly shifting international order, we believe that our mission – engaging the public and leaders to better understand global affairs and America's role in the world – is more vital than ever.

# WACDFW HISTORY

A nonpartisan, nonprofit organization, the Council was founded in 1951 by some of the city's most prominent citizens to engage residents in global issues and position North Texas as a player on the world stage.

Founders included famed merchandiser Stanley Marcus, Dallas Mayor J. Woodall Rodgers and industrialist H. Neil Mallon, for whom our annual award is named.





# BACKGROUND



The mission of the nonprofit, nonpartisan World Affairs Council of Dallas/Fort Worth (WACDFW) is to promote international awareness, understanding and connections to enhance the region's global stature and to prepare North Texans to thrive in our complex world.

WACDFW is a dynamic organization that brings international awareness and cross-cultural understanding to the North Texas community and presents distinguished international figures year-round for in-depth interpretations of global events. Today, it serves as a gateway to the world for the region, offering an impressive range of programs and events for the public and its 4,200 members.

# WACDFW DEPARTMENTS

The Council coordinates visits to North Texas of delegations and leaders from around the world through the International Visitor Leadership Program, which serves as a local component to the U.S. State Department's premier professional exchange program.

## IVLP

The City of Dallas' Protocol Office is a public/private partnership between the City of Dallas and WACDFW. The Protocol Office works with the Office of the Mayor, city officials, the diplomatic corps and other international stakeholders to represent the City of Dallas in official international activities.

## PROTOCOL

The Meridian program tailors dynamic and enlightening events for World Affairs Council members in their 20s and 30s.

Meridian members come from all professions and backgrounds, but share a common interest in international topics – business, culture, politics, economics and current events.

## MERIDIAN: GLOBAL YOUNG PROFESSIONALS

Each spring, the Council accepts nominations for our 20 Under 20 Award which recognizes the 20 top JWAC students around DFW. Nominated students submit their application and those chosen are given an award plus a three-day private leadership training in June.

# 6 JWAC LEADERSHIP TRAININGS

# SPONSOR

**Your job is to provide guidance to students and coordinate club participation in Global Young Leaders (GYL) programs on and off campus.**

- Mentor and empower your JWAC officers by informing them about events and resources available.
- Submit necessary paperwork to allow students to attend GYL events.
- Facilitate communication between officers, school administrators and parents.
- Send names of students attending events and photo releases to Director of Education at WACDFW.
- Communicate club accomplishments throughout year with WACDFW.



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# PRESIDENT

**Your job is to lead, motivate, and set an example for your JWAC.**

Establish a mission & goals for the club that year and steer members toward that focus. Set frequency of meetings, then plan and lead them with the other officers.

Research opportunities offered by GYL that year at [dfwworld.org](http://dfwworld.org) and communicate them.

Communicate with WACDFW Director of Education about your JWAC's involvement.

For PwC Academic WorldQuest, create qualification tests and decide on the teams.



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# VICE PRESIDENT

**Your job is to support and execute the vision of the president.**

- Help facilitate meetings, set agendas and communicate with members.
- Decide which organization(s)/cause(s) your club will support that school year.
- Consult with members on goals of service projects and fundraisers.
- Work with the president to maintain an open line of communication with sponsor, officers and members.



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# OUTGOING PRESIDENT

**Your job is to share your insights and tips with the new leadership.**

- Put together a transition kit/document outlining your strategies and advice for the success of the club.
- Meet with new leadership and sponsor to offer your perspective in the transition period.
- Provide new officers with important dates in next school year, such as JWAC Orientation.
- Email Director of Education at WACDFW with names and contact information of new President and VP.



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# SECRETARY

**Your job is to ensure the club runs smoothly with effective communication.**

- Take notes at each JWAC meetings and email them to the members.
- Take attendance and photos at events and document club participation throughout year.
- Inform members about upcoming opportunities and how to register.
- Promote JWAC events on campus and inform local media about major initiatives when your sponsor deems appropriate.



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# TREASURER

**Your job is to document and manage club funds with the help of your teacher sponsor.**

- Maintain communication with officers and members about necessary dues and fees.
- Collect and record membership dues then turn them over to your sponsor.
- Consult with sponsor about school's policies on fundraising and handling of donations.
- Manage record keeping and security of donations at fundraisers.



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# SOCIAL MEDIA CHAIR

**Your job is to maintain the club's social media presence and/or blog content.**

- Consult with sponsor about school's policies related to club social media pages & postings.
- With sponsor permission, create and maintain social media accounts (i.e. Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc.) and/or a blog to share experiences at JWAC events.
- Ensure parental permission is given for members under 18 featured in JWAC photos before posting online.
- Tag WACDFW @dfwworld
- Use good judgement!

# RECRUITMENT CHAIR

**Your job is to raise awareness of JWAC on your campus and recruit students to join the club.**

- Host a booth at school events to promote JWAC and raise awareness of the overall mission of JWAC and GYL.

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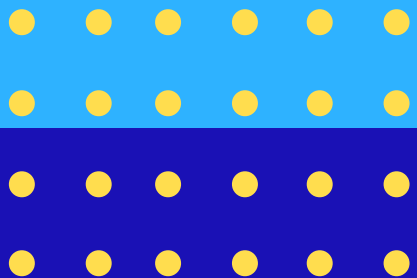

# HOW TO RUN AN ELECTION

- Notify members 4-6 weeks before an election.
- Ask members to nominate others or self-nominate to establish a ballot of officer candidates.
- Outline the responsibilities of each the officer positions.
- It is best to conduct elections in the months of March or April to allow for a transition and mentoring period.
- There are 2 suggested types of elections: Joint Vote and Separate Vote

# JOINT VOTE

- In a joint vote, President and Vice President candidates will run joint campaigns, similar to the U.S. presidential election.
- The pair that wins the absolute majority will be named President and Vice President.
- Other officer positions should be voted on through a separate ballot system.



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# SEPARATE VOTE

- In a separate vote election, members vote for each officer position separately.
- The candidate that receives the absolute majority for each position will be named the winner.

# OTHER SUGGESTIONS

- If your JWAC has a relatively small number of candidates, it may be possible to allow candidates to run for more than one position.
- If you are split school (9-10th grade at one campus, 11-12th grade at a main campus), consider asking each secondary campus to vote for a junior representative.
- Consider making Vice President a position only open to juniors, each year the previous Vice President can then transfer into the President position. This allows for mentoring and continuity between each new officer group.

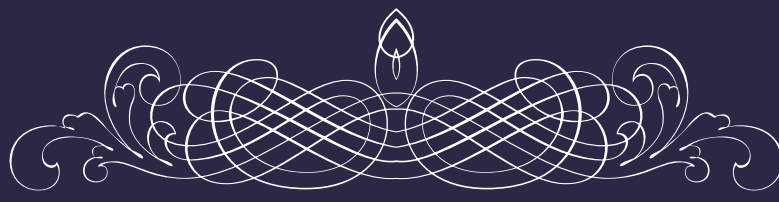

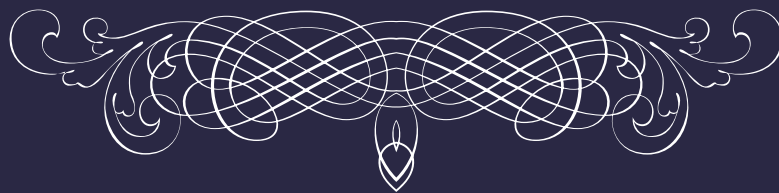

## GLOBAL YOUNG LEADERS Student Guidelines for Attending WACDFW Programs

### BEFORE THE PROGRAM

If you see that you will not be able to attend the day of the event for emergency reasons or you are delayed please text **Jennifer Bowden** at (972) **355-9499** and leave a message.

### COST OF PROGRAMS

1. Students and teachers who are Council members will attend the programs at no additional cost to the student, teacher, or school.
2. Schools may purchase seats or additional seats at the cost of the program.
3. Parents who wish to attend will have to purchase their ticket before the event or at the door if seats are available.

### STUDENT PREPARATION FOR THE EVENT

1. Go online [www.dfwworld.org](http://www.dfwworld.org) for information regarding the speaker within the calendar page.
2. Prep students on the speaker prior to the event.
3. Students are to prepare a LEGIBLE question on an index card to ask the speaker.
4. LABEL EACH CARD with the **student's name, grade and school**.
5. Select the BEST student questions and turn them in at the registration table.
6. Each student is to complete the photo release form and get is signed by a parent.

### DRESS CODE

Preferred student dress for this event is business. However, students will be admitted in business casual. Jeans are not desirable.

### PARKING OF SCHOOL BUSES OR SCHOOL VANS

The cost of parking will be paid by the school or school district. The Council is **not responsible** for parking.

### ARRIVAL & EVENT CHECK-IN

1. You will need to arrive at specified registration time so that we may get you seated in a timely fashion.
2. Ask those individuals working the registration table to identify who is in charge of checking in the students. Ask students to remain in a separate place that will not hinder registration at the event.

2. Put your napkin in your lap when you sit down to begin eating.
3. Pass things to the left if possible; this helps with the flow of food.
4. The silverware will be used from the outside in.
5. When you are finished with a course, please put your fork and knife on your plate. This informs the server that you are finished eating.

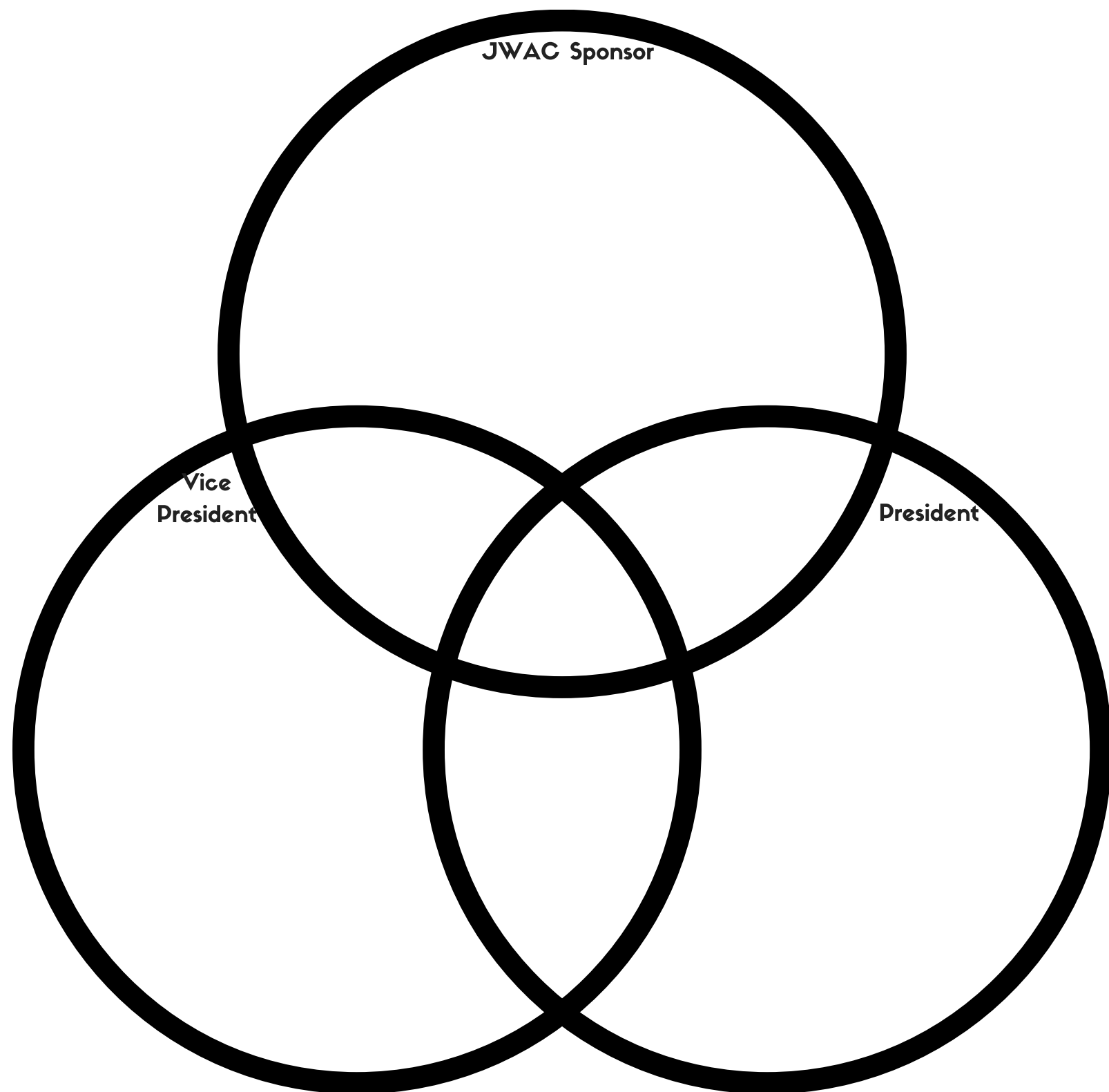
