


Survey on Principals' Perception of Global Competence

56% of principals answered that there are little or <u>no opportunities for students to develop</u> <u>global competence</u> in their schools.


72% of principals reported that there were little or <u>no opportunities for teacher professional</u> <u>development</u> to help teachers in their school develop skills and knowledge to develop global competence.



World's Fastest Growing Economies



Although some students may perceive countries outside the West to be poor and desolate, many countries in the Asia, Africa, and the Middle East actually show great promise and are some of the fastest growing economies of the world.



So what does it mean to be Globally Competent?

"Global competence is defined in PISA as 'the capacity to examine global and intercultural issues, to take multiple perspectives, to engage in open, appropriate and effective interactions with people from different cultures and to act for collective well-being and sustainable development'." Why is global competence important?



In 2013, Google decided to test its hiring hypothesis by crunching every bit and byte of hiring, firing, and promotion data accumulated since the company's incorporation in 1998. Project Oxygen shocked everyone by concluding that, among the eight most important qualities of Google's top employees, STEM expertise comes in dead last. The seven top characteristics of success at Google are all soft skills: being a good coach; communicating and listening well; possessing insights into others (including others different values and points of view); having empathy toward and being supportive of one's colleagues; being a good critical thinker and problem solver; and being able to make connections across complex ideas.






GLOBAL COMPETENCE ASSESSMENT

Global Competence Associates, LLC are the leaders in the original worldwide consensus research on global competence since 1999. Our rigorous research is foundational to our portfolio of supportive services such as assessment, training, certification, and consultation. We are the creators of the Global Competence Aptitude Assessment (GCAA)®, which objectively measures the cultural knowledge, people skills, and attitudes that are critical for global readiness.

In 2013 and 2015, the Council measured Global Competence using this GCAA test. We plan to bring this back in April-May 2020.

WORLD AFFAIRS COUNCILS OF AMERICA

The World Affairs Council of Dallas/Fort Worth is a member of the World Affairs Councils of America (WACA) network, which traces its earliest roots to 1918, when the League of Free Nations Association was formed to support President Wilson's efforts to achieve peace. At the end of World War I, the Association's founders were concerned that Americans would choose isolationism over a foreign policy based on international engagement. They worked to promote and nurture public awareness of critical international issues affecting the U.S., and in 1923 reconstituted the organization as the Foreign Policy Association. John Foster Dulles and Eleanor Roosevelt were among the FPA's incorporators.

Today, there are roughy 90 World Affairs Councils throughout the United States with a share mission. In an age of globalization and a rapidly shifting international order, we believe that our mission – engaging the public and leaders to better understand global affairs and America's role in the world – is more vital than ever.

WACDFW HISTORY

A nonpartisan, nonprofit organization, the Council was founded in 1951 by some of the city's most prominent citizens to engage residents in global issues and position North Texas as a player on the world stage.

Founders included famed merchandiser Stanley Marcus, Dallas Mayor J. Woodall Rodgers and industrialist H. Neil Mallon, for whom our annual award is named.



BACKGROUND

The mission of the nonprofit, nonpartisan World Affairs Council of Dallas/Fort Worth (WACDFW) is to promote international awareness, understanding and connections to enhance the region's global stature and to prepare North Texans to thrive in our complex world.

WACDFW is a dynamic organization that brings international awareness and cross-cultural understanding to the North Texas community and presents distinguished international figures year-round for in-depth interpretations of global events.Today, it serves as a gateway to the world for the region, offering an impressive range of programs and events for the public and its 4,200 members.

WACDFW DEPARTMENTS

The Council coordinates visits to North Texas of delegations and leaders from around the world through the International Visitor Leadership Program, which serves as a local component to the U.S. State Department's premier professional exchange program.

IVLP

The City of Dallas' ProtocolOffice is a public/private partnership between the City of Dallas and WACDFW. The Protocol Office works with the Office of the Mayor, city officials, the diplomatic corps and other international stakeholders to represent the City of Dallas in official international activities.

PROTOCOL

The Meridian program tailors dynamic and enlightening events for World Affairs Council members in their 20s and 30s. Meridian members come from all professions and backgrounds, but share a common interest in international topics business, culture, politics, economics and current events.

The Council presents around 100 programs annually, primarily focusing on the international aspects of business, politics, culture and foreign policy. With the goal of connecting North Texas with the world, the Council has been educating Metroplex citizens on global affairs since 1951.

JUNIOR WORLD AFFAIRS COUNCILS

For more than a decade, our Junior World Affairs Councils (JWACs) have been a global triumph on local campuses. With more than 70 chapters in North Texas, JWAC is a great way for high school students to learn about international issues and become more globally aware. JWAC chapters can be started at any high school with students in grades 9-12 with the support of one of the school's teachers as a sponsor.

The Council will help you create a Junior World Affairs Council for your campus. It's a simple process with a \$50 annual JWAC membership fee that covers a teacher sponsor and all of the students who are active in the club. 20 Under 20

Each spring, the Council accepts nominations for our 20 Under 20 Award which recognizes the 20 top JWAC students around DFW. Nominated students submit their application and those chosen are given an award plus a three-day private leadership training in June.

Internships with the **Council**

The Council accepts high school and college applications for our unpaid internship positions in spring, summer and fall. Interns are accepted in each Council department and get real-world experience in a business setting, hear from our prestigious speakers, meet with our board, etc.





Trainings take place over 2-3 hours on weekday evenings or Saturday morning/early afternoon. There is not a registration fee & all JWAC students are welcomed to attend.

Sessions are hosted by local experts who can impart knowledge on the subject to JWAC students through presentations and hands-on activities. Space for each training is limited so participants MUST pre-register.

Academic WorldQuest

Annual competition in February, testing students' knowledge of world affairs. Winning team goes to the National WorldQuest in Washington, DC (paid by WAC) in April to compete against teams from around the U.S. Prizes are awarded.

International Career Day

Students attend annual event in fall to learn about volunteering and global careers around the world including: Human Rights, Business, Finance, Technology, Defense, Foreign Service, Education, Journalism, Advertising, Health, Transportation, Energy, etc.







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how to run an election

- Notify members 4-6 weeks before an election.
- Ask members to nominate others or selfnominate to establish a ballot of officer candidates.
- Outline the responsibilities of each the officer positions.
- It is best to conduct elections in the months of March or April to allow for a transition and mentoring period.
- There are 2 suggested types of elections: Joint Vote and Separate Vote



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
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
- In a joint vote, President and Vice President candidates will run joint campaigns, similar to the U.S. presidential election.
- The pair that wins the absolute majority will be named President and Vice President.
- Other officer positions should be voted on through a separate ballot system.







- In a separate vote election, members vote for each officer position separately.
- The candidate that receives the absolute majority for each position will be named the winner.





OTHER SUGGESTIONS

- If your JWAC has a relatively small number of
 andidates, it may be possible to allow candidates
 and to run for more than one position.
- If you are split school (9-10th grade at one campus, 11-12th grade at a main campus), consider asking each secondary campus to vote for a junior representative.
- Consider making Vice President a position only open to juniors, each year the previous Vice President can then transfer into the President position. This allows for mentoring and continuity between each new officer group.

- 1. Beverages are on the right side or top right of the plate. The coffee cup will normally have your napkin in it on the right. The water and tea will be on the top right of the serving set. Bread is on the left.
- 2. Put your napkin in your lap when you sit down to begin eating.
- 3. Pass things to the left if possible; this helps with the flow of food.
- 4. The silverware will be used from the outside in.
- 5. When you are finished with a course, please put your fork and knife on your plate. This informs the server that you are finished eating.





Organize a Current Events Debate

• Come up with a topic you would like to discuss. (Ex: immigration, refugee resettlement, nuclear proliferation, international trade agreements, etc.)

- Assign JWAC members different sides of the issue and one student or teacher to be the moderator
- Research the topic and arguments surrounding it. Use <u>www.ProCon.org</u> for help.
- Host a debate where one side defends the notion and the other group criticizes it
- Invite your peers to attend the debate
- Ask your peers vote on the most convincing argument and state why

Hold a Fundraiser

- Check with your JWAC sponsor that you are allowed to fundraise based on your school's rules
- Identify a non-profit organization that your JWAC wants to support
- Learn about event planning and fundraising best practices through online research and speaking to people in your network who have experience
- Set a date, decide on the format of the event, and get proper permissions from your school
