Women's Rights & Protections Guaranteed by the Government

"Equality, social justice, the provision of safety and security and equality of opportunity for all citizens shall be the bases of the community." - **Article 14**, **UAE Constitution** "All persons shall be equal before the law. No discrimination shall be practi[c]ed between citizens of the Union by reason of race, nationality, religious belief, or social position." - Article 25, UAE Constitution

"Society shall be responsible for protecting childhood and motherhood and shall protect minors and others unable to look after themselves for any reason..." - Article 16, UAE Constitution

"Public service shall be open to all citizens on a basis of equality of circumstances between them, in accordance with the provisions of the law."

- Article 35, UAE
Constitution

Now: around 95% for both

K-12: 910,000 students in 1,174 schools (2013-2014)

Universities: Public universities are free

Veiling Restrictions/Choice of Clothing

- In 2012, two Emirati women launched a popular Twitter campaign advocating for foreigners to dress modestly within their country, but what did the UAE think?
- Many choose to veil because of personal religious beliefs, and nearly 100% of women are Muslim
- "Men should not be bare-chested away from the beach and women are advised not to wear short skirts and to keep their shoulders covered"(2).
- A ton of western clothing is sold in Dubai; over 200,000 visitors a day!
- Despite cultural norms and restrictions, it could be worse
- Saudi Arabia: "I was forced to wear the veil and I wish no other woman had to suffer it"-Nesrine Malik
- The Sharjah Emirate restricts women from wearing swimsuits on public beaches; Dubai on the other hand...

Marriage

- Tribal division, lawyers, and cultural reasons; Fatima
- "A woman must be respected and supported by the laws, staying away from the societal barriers that protect the males and creates pressure on the women under the pretext of protection" (4).
- Women need parental permission before remarrying, due to a 2005 law
- Often forced; Sharia law
- Guardians only need to have reached puberty, as one court case demonstrated.
- "If her father is not available, or deceased, then it would be her son, followed by her brother"(5).
- Certain people want this rule, but with age limits
- Penal Code, Article 365 (10); Jailing and deportation
- Women need a guardian's approval to marry one person
- Women need court orders to apply for divorce and it is on limited grounds, but men have free reigns

Reproductive Freedoms

- Women are absolutely prohibited from receiving abortions by their own will
- Doctors can receive five years imprisonment for performing abortions
- Abortifacients may not be issued
- If a woman's life is in danger, approved gynecologists are allowed to perform abortions.
- Husband or guardian permission is required
- Causes many to turn to illegal, self-induced abortions or to get an abortion in another country



Domestic Violence

Domestic Violence

- There are no specific laws against domestic violence outside of general assault charges. Rape charges are difficult to report; zina
- Penal Code article 53; 2010
- Police discouragement of reports
